President's Report

Kiama Downs is a tight knit club that continues to pride itself on the delivery of Surf Life Saving activities to the local community. We are a young club entering our 40th year; however, we continue to lead the way in all facets of Surf Life Saving.

This year our members (554) ensured the beach and surrounds were patrolled through 9 different Patrols totalling 4400 hours and conducting 5 rescues.

Our equipment is always presented and maintained to the required standard which continually is commented on at gear inspection. We continue to find new members from our community and nipper parents, our trainers look to provide training before or after Nippers allowing for the whole family to be involved in the Club.

With Covid still affecting this year's season, the Committee's goals were to ensure that we were in a position to patrol our beach and provide surf life saving services. Our strategy was to give back to the members as much as possible and to hopefully take away any excuses for not being able to Patrol.

Firstly, we offered free membership with the Club funding all additional costs over what State provided. We also looked to fund lunches for patrolling members, but this was only the start as we continually provided updates on Covid and how we were managing this in our Club and how SLSA was going to deal with Covid on Patrols. Kiama Downs acquired personal reusable face masks for the availability to any patrolling member.

Our involvement in the community continued as normal as possible even with Covid restrictions still in place. Kiama Downs as a club hosted the largest Australia Day celebration in the Kiama Municipality putting on our Breaky on the Beach, which was attended by our Federal, State and local elected officials.

We also were successful in obtaining two grants, a State Government grant for a patrol observation tower that allows a clear line of sight of the beach whilst providing a protected facility for our members. The second grant was from the Federal Government providing funding for our training and education room.

In addition to the grants, the Club, with support from the local community, purchased a Beach Wheelchair that has been made available to the community allowing all to be able to get onto the beach. This has been a successful initiative with many of the community using the wheelchair on multiple occasions.





Our facilities continued to provide a meeting place for Club members and the wider community with many events being held including Santa photos, Australia Day, End of Patrol Season BBQ and Anzac Day celebrations and we did it in a Covid safe manner.





Sundays @ the Surfie continued to bring new people to experience the atmosphere and companionship at the Club.

Our Santa photos on the beach were again well received by the community with all bookings sold out and extra timeslots provided for Members only. The team of Club members and the photographer excelled during tough weather conditions providing treasured photos and a great fundraising event.

Kiama Downs also hosted the Branch Carnival this year with some very challenging weather events to overcome, the first weekend was cancelled due to poor surf conditions (East Coast Low) and a condensed carnival was successfully held again with some very challenging weather conditions.



In Competition our Club again performed well at Nationals, State, Country and Branch carnivals at all levels of the Club with our IRB team winning State and the State Premiership series.

Treasurer's Report:

Firstly, I would like to thank Julie Greenfeld for assisting me throughout the year. Julie has been a great support and done an amazing job keeping our records up to date.

The Club is in a strong financial position. We were able to meet all expense obligations without drawing on savings. Our total cash at bank at the beginning of the financial year was \$184,680. At the end of the financial year, we held a total amount of \$182,318 – a difference of \$2,362 which was drawn from our operational account (cheque account).

Over the last 12 months we have purchased an Observation Tower, ATV, Projector and Screen for the Training room, 6 Nipper Boards and 6 Body Boards, Defibrillator, Two Marquees, Signage in the Foyer, Zoom equipment in the main hall and 4 additional sensor locks.

We have been very fortunate to have received grants totally \$88,020 from the NSW Government Office of Sport, Surf Life Saving NSW and the Australian Government via Fiona Phillips MP, Member for Gilmore, which were used to purchase most of these items. We are extremely thankful to the State Premier, local MP Gareth Ward MP for the support given to our Surf Club.

We acknowledge:

- NSW Government's Department of Justice for the ongoing funding of state-wide operations, which benefit all members through the State co-operative agreement.
- NSW Government for the support provided through The Office of Sport.
- Federal Government for the Beach Safety Equipment Funding which directed \$5,000 to every SLSC for the purchase of vital rescue equipment, first aid and medical supplies.
- Federal Government for the VET Funding which enabled hundreds of assessors to update their training qualifications and provided clubs with updated training equipment including QCPR manikins and tablets.

As a club fundraising was also undertaken – Australia Day, Santa Photos and Triathlons raised a total of \$20,375.

The community and local businesses have contributed to our club by way of donations totalling \$18,442. We have been fortunate to have received financial support from:

Another great source of income is hall hire (\$11,925) which then flows through to sales at the Bar (\$11,809).

Sponsorship from Kiama Downs Medical Practice together with a donation from Denise Emmett assisted in the purchase of our Beach Wheelchair.

Members have benefited from our strong financial position. All patrolling members had their membership fees paid for the 2021/2022 season. We have also supported our club representatives by paying Competition fees for all competitors.

As part of the celebrations for our 40th year we have hosted a formal dinner celebrating with Life Members, past and present committee, major award recipients of Club Person of the Year, Patrol Person of the Year and the Bill Gowan Award. We have also purchased pavers which will form a commemorative pathway on the northern side of the building.

As we move into our 40th year we can be proud of our achievements and look forward to ongoing success through club member involvement and our strong sense of community.

The members that encourage their family and friends to join serve a great purpose and our trainers that put in their time and effort to educate these new members are immeasurable to the value that they add to the Club.

We are receiving a new beach vehicle which will help our patrols.



The 2021/22 season at Kiama Downs SLSC was another enjoyable and safe year at the hands of the Club's skilled and dedicated IRB crews.

With Covid restrictions still lingering, Club patrolling members and call out teams volunteering their time again provided skilled IRB operators who provide an important rescue capacity servicing the Jones Beach and surrounding foreshore areas. Further, the Club's IRB crew was called on to provide flood response capabilities in both Nowra and the other parts along the south coast in February/March. Fortunately our services were not required but the time committed and the capacity and dedication of the crews was again evident.

The IRB's and the Club's crews have again been very professional in providing water safety support for local sporting events, an important fundraising opportunity for the Club.

After Covid impacted, 2021 IRB season was shortened to just 2 carnivals, competition kicked off fresh in 2022 and after a full Season of 4 Premiership rounds and the State Championships, Kiama Downs continue to be a strong force and claimed victory in both the NSW IRB Premiership Series and the NSW State Championships, winning more than half of the gold medals on offer in both Championships.

What a Year

In our first full competition season in 3 years, due to Covid, Kiama Downs IRB Team Showed they still have what it takes to give it to the larger clubs and come out on top.

NSW IRB Premiership Champions NSW IRB State Champions 12 Members selected in NSW State IRB Team 8 Australian Medals 4th in Australian U23 Point score 2nd in Australian Masters Point score

Kiama Downs long and proud history of being a force in IRB Competition continues, well done team.

<u>NSW IRB Premiership</u> started with Round 1 at Terrigal with testing surf and some new faces in the team. After a tough 2 days we had to settle for 2nd place being beaten by arch rivals Caves Beach.

Round 2 saw Kiama Downs bounce back and claim the victory at Bulli Beach, following on with a victory and grabbing the victory at round 3 in Broulee and taking the lead by just 2 points heading into the final round of the Premiership at Ocean Beach. Another dominant display saw the team defend the NSW IRB Premiership title and take 10 individual NSW Premiership titles along the way.

State Championships – South West Rocks

State Championships returned to a beach which has given our Club much success over the years and it is pleasing to see that Kiama Downs claimed the NSW State IRB title with 121 points on the Point Score 10 points clear of Caves Beach in second place with South Maroubra finishing in 3rd place.

The point score total is the highest total in the history of IRB competition and a credit to our teams' hard work and skill. We claimed 12 of the 21 gold medals on offer and topped off a great weekend by having 11 members named in the NSW State IRB Team.

<u>Australian IRB Championships</u> were held at Mollymook and again the team gave it their all in some very testing conditions. The Open Championships were moved to Thursday and Friday due to concerning weather and surf conditions which were set to deteriorate and potentially prevent completion of the championships.

We had 4 teams make finals and finished with 4, 4th places. Saturday and Sunday had the U23, Masters and Interstate Championships.

In the U23s we made 4 finals finishing with 2nd in the U23 Tube rescue, 4th in the U23 Mass, 4th in the U23 rescue and 6th in the U23 Teams.

The Masters we made all 8 finals and medalled in 7. Broadbeach QLD took top spot this year with KD finishing in 2nd overall.

Gold in the 35 Male Tube rescue was a standout performance by the team, Alex Rainsford drove the house down to claim victory after a massive swim by Nathan Foster and Brad Honey. The boys had to swim 3 tubes in an hour due the races being run in block format (due to concerns of surf increasing) this in itself is pretty impressive but it would be wrong not to point out Nathan was in a world of hurt after hitting a wave hard in the Mass rescue semi just prior to the tube heats starting. With skin off and aching bones the boys got the job done and we couldn't be prouder of them if we tried.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Australian Charities and not-for profits Commission Act 2012. The association is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards. The club is not a reporting entity.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in the financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply including reference to AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and errors, AASB Interpretation of Standards and AASB 1054 Austalian Additional Disclosures. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below. They have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except for cash flow information, have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Revenue

The entity recognised revenue under AASB 15: Revenue from contracts with Customers and AASB 1058: Income of Not-for-Profit Entities.

Trading Revenue

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Donation & Fundraising

The entity receives donations which are recognised as income when received, fundraising events are held and where money and assets are transfered to the entity in excess of the asset passed to the customer, these are also recognised upon receipt.

Contributed Assets

The entity receives assets in the form of grants funding from government and other parties for nil consideration in order to further its objectives. These assets are recognised in accordance wiht the recognition requirements of other applicatble accouting standards.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Revenue from training services is generally recognised once the training has been delivered.

Subscriptions

Revenue from the provision of membership subscriptions is recognised on a straight line basis over the financial year.

Other Income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the association is entitled to it.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Trade and Other Receivables

Accounts receivable are recognised initially at the transaction price (i.e. cost) and are subsequently measured at cost less provision for impairment. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of accounts receivable and other receivables are reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that the amounts are not recoverable. If so, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in statement of comprehensive income.

Prepayments

Prepayments are recognised when a payment is made for services that the association expects to utilise over a period of time. Prepayments are measured at the unexpended portion of the contractual cost of the services. Expenditure is transferred to profits and losses on a straight line basis over the period to which it relates.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs are assigned on a first-in first-out basis.

Stores are valued at cost.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Property

Freehold land and buildings are shown at their fair value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by external independent valuers, less accumulated depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of land and buildings are credited to a revaluation surplus in other comprehensive income. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are recognised against revaluation surplus directly in other comprehensive income; all other decreases are recognised in profit or loss.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are recognised as expenses in profit or loss during the financial period in which they are incurred.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

The asset's residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the statement of comprehensive income. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Financial Instruments

Initial Measurement

Financial assets and liabilities are recognised when the company becomes party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is the date that the company commits itself to either the purchase or sale of the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments (except for trade receivables) are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Trade receivables are initially measured at the transaction price if the trade receivables do not contain a significant financing component or if the practical expedient has been applied as specified in AASB 15.63.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are subsequently measured at:

- amortised cost; or
- fair value through profit and loss.

A financial liability is measured at fair value through profit and loss if the financial liability is:

- a contingent consideration of an acquirer in a business combination to which AASB 3 applies;
- held for trading; or
- initially designated as at fair value through profit or loss.

All other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at fair value, amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest rate is the internal rate of return of the financial asset or liability. That is, it is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash flows through the expected life of the instrument to the net carrying amount at initial recognition.

A financial liability is held for trading if it is:

- incurred for the purpose of repurchasing or repaying in the near term;
- part of a portfolio where there is an actual pattern of short-term profit taking; or
- a derivative financial instrument (except for a derivative that is in a financial guarantee contract or a derivative that is in an effective hedging relationship).

Any gains or losses arising on changes in fair value are recognised in profit or loss to the extent that they are not part of a designated hedging relationship.

The change in fair value of the financial liability attributable to changes in the issuer's credit risk is taken to other comprehensive income and is not subsequently reclassified to profit or loss. Instead, it is transferred to retained earnings upon derecognition of the financial liability.

If taking the change in credit risk in other comprehensive income enlarges or creates an accounting mismatch, then these gains or losses should be taken to profit or loss rather than other comprehensive income.

A financial liability cannot be reclassified.

A liability is derecognised when it is extinguished (ie when the obligation in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires). An exchange of an existing financial liability for a new one with substantially modified terms, or substantial modification to the terms of a financial liability, is treated as an extinguishment of the existing liability and recognition of a new financial liability.

The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Financial assets

Financial assets are subsequently measured at:

- amortised cost;
- fair value through other comprehensive income; or
- fair value through profit and loss

On the basis of the two primary criteria, being:

- the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset; and
- the business model for managing the financial assets.

A financial asset is subsequently measured at amortised cost when it meets the following conditions:

- the financial asset is managed solely to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms within the financial asset give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding on specified dates.

A financial asset is subsequently measured at fair value through other comprehensive income when it meets the following conditions:

- the contractual terms within the financial asset give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding on specified dates.
- the business model for managing the financial asset comprises both contractual cash flows collection and the selling of the financial asset.

By default, all other financial assets that do not meet the conditions of amortised cost and the fair value through other comprehensive income's measurement condition are subsequently measured at fair value through profit and loss.

The entity initially designates financial instruments as measured at fair value through profit or loss if:

- it eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency (often referred to as "accounting mismatch") that would otherwise arise from measuring assets or liabilities or recognising the gains and losses on them on different bases;
- it is in accordance to the documented risk management or investment strategy and information about the groupings was documented appropriately, so the performance of the financial liability that was part of an entity of financial liabilities or financial assets can be managed and evaluated consistently on a fair value basis; and
- it is a hybrid contract that contains an embedded derivative that significantly modifies the cash flows otherwise required by the contract.

The initial designation of the financial instruments to measure at fair value through profit and loss is a one-time option on initial classification and is irrevocable until the financial asset is derecognised.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

A financial asset is derecognised when the holder's contractual rights to its cash flows expires, or the asset is transferred in such a way that all the risks and rewards of ownership are substantially transferred.

All of the following criteria need to be satisfied for derecognition of a financial asset:

- the right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired or been transferred;
- all risk and rewards of ownership of the asset have been substantially transferred; and
- the entity no longer controls the asset (ie it has no practical ability to make unilateral decisions to sell the asset to a third party).

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of a debt instrument classified as fair value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investments revaluation reserve is reclassified to profit or loss.

On derecognition of an investment in equity which was elected to be classified under fair value through other comprehensive income, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the investments revaluation reserve in not reclassified to profit or loss, but is transferred to retained earnings.

Impairment

The entity recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on:

- financial assets that are measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income;
- lease receivables;
- contract assets;
- loan commitments that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss; and
- financial guarantee contracts that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

Loss allowance is not recognised for:

- financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss; or
- equity instruments measured at fair value through other comprehensive income.

Expected credit losses are the probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of a financial instrument. A credit loss is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due and all cash flows expected to be received, all discounted at the original effective interest rate of the financial instrument.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the association reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount in accordance with another standard. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease in accordance with that other standard.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the entity during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

Income Tax

The association is exempt from income tax under section 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Leases

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the company commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted). Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss" in which case transaction costs are recognised immediately as expenses in profit or loss.

Finance leases are capitalised, recognising an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives where it is likely that the entity will obtain ownership of the asset. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are recognised as expenses on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Lease incentives under operating leases are recognised as a liability and amortised on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production that necessarily take a substantial period of time to prepare for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in the income statement in the period in which they are incurred.

Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The committee members evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the Association.

Key judgments - Employee benefits

For the purpose of measurement, AASB 119: Employee Benefits (September 2011) defines obligations for short-term employee benefits as obligations expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related services. As the entity expects that most employees will not use all of their annual leave entitlements in the same year in which they are earned or during the 12-month period that follows the directors believe that obligations for annual leave entitlements satisfy the definition of other long-term employee benefits and, therefore, are required to be measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees.
